

APHA Briefing Note 24/24

Quality concerns with the completion of TN52 non-bovine test charts

Date issued: 02 July 2024

Purpose

To remind Official Veterinarians (OVs) undertaking non-bovine TB skin testing of the importance of submitting a correctly completed non-bovine test chart (TN52).

Background

There have been ongoing issues with around 20% of non-bovine test charts for tests carried out in England being submitted to APHA improperly completed. The chart processing team spend at least 6 -10 hours a week contacting practices in order to obtain a correctly completed document. This has a very significant impact on team resource and can delay the recording of important animal health data.

We will be writing to individual OVs if the forms are not correctly completed. Repeated failure to complete the forms correctly may result in further investigation and possibly suspension of TT authorisation.

Action

Please can OVs be cognisant of the need to complete these test charts in their entirety. The following list is not exhaustive but highlights areas where information has been found to be incomplete:

- Missing OV stamp
- No readings at 72 hours

APHA is an Executive Agency of the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs and also works on behalf of the Scottish Government, Welsh Government and Food Standards Agency to safeguard animal and plant health for the benefit of people, the environment and the economy.

- No Avian and Tuberculin batch numbers recorded
- No dates of test
- No CPH entered
- No signature (on one or both pages)
- Multiple species on the same chart.
- Species and animal details missing
