

APHA Briefing Note 27/20

Advice for OVs to pass on to cattle keepers regarding passports of TB reactor animals during the COVID-19 outbreak

Date issued: 20 August 2020

Purpose

To recommend that Official Veterinarians (OVs) undertaking TB skin testing in England, Scotland and Wales during the COVID-19 outbreak advise cattle keepers to check that any reactors disclosed have a valid passport. If a passport is found to be incorrect or is lost, missing or destroyed, the keeper should contact APHA immediately for specific advice before contacting BCMS.

Background

- 1. TB reactors should have passports available at the time of the valuation. Cattle with a passport that has incorrect details (e.g. incorrect sex or breed) must not be consigned to an abattoir.
- 2. Cattle without the correct documents will be deemed to have no market value and will not be valued. They will also require on-farm slaughter.
- 3. Due to the current coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak, BCMS may experience delays in dealing with requests for passport amendments or for replacement passports.
- 4. Temporary changes to requesting passport amendments have been implemented by BCMS with guidance on GOV.UK.

Specific Instructions

- 1. OVs are kindly requested that on disclosure of reactor animals when undertaking TB skin testing in England, Scotland and Wales, they advise the cattle keeper to check that they have a valid passport for each animal at the earliest opportunity.
- 2. Cattle keepers should also be advised that if the passport of any reactor animal is incorrect, so needing amendment, or is missing, so that they will need to request a replacement from BCMS, they should contact APHA immediately.
